
Selwyn College



Admissions at Selwyn

Selwyn admits those students who are most likely to thrive on the academic experience offered at Cambridge. We are looking for people who have both performed outstandingly in their studies and have the potential to apply themselves further to excel on our courses. Enthusiasm for, and commitment to, the subject you intend to study is vital, often demonstrated by evidence of your own academic exploration outside the classroom.

The admissions process provides us with as complete a picture as possible of an applicant's interests, motivation, and their academic ability and aptitude for their chosen course. We look carefully at each student's record in examinations, set in the context of their academic background and opportunities. We aim to invite the majority of applicants for academically searching interviews, which form only part of our overall assessment. For some subjects we require students to sit additional assessments. In others, we ask candidates to submit some relevant work that they've produced at school and which can be discussed at interview. The process allows us to spend a considerable amount of time on each candidate, and is tailored towards assessing each student as an individual.

If you are the sort of person who achieves high grades, relishes the prospect of studying in an intellectually challenging environment, and is willing to put in the time and effort needed to be successful in your studies, then we believe that you will be very much at home at Selwyn.

Study at Selwyn

Selwyn is at the geographical heart of the University. A ten-minute walk from the city centre, it appeals to students who want to live in the city but away from the crowds and traffic. The College is on a spacious site including beautiful gardens. The secluded areas create a calm and relaxing environment for the benefit of all members.

Next door to Selwyn is the University's Sidgwick Site, home to most arts, humanities, and social science faculties. The University Library is just across the road. We are equidistant from the city centre departments and the West Cambridge site. All the science departments and wider University facilities are within easy reach.

Teaching and learning at Cambridge take various forms. 'Supervisions' are one element that makes the Cambridge experience stand out. This small-group teaching allows students to meet in groups of two to four, or sometimes even one-to-one, with a specialist in the topic that they're studying.

One of the strengths of supervisions is that they are tailored to the needs of individual students who receive in-depth feedback on work that they've prepared ahead of time, and can ask lots of questions as they go along. Supervisions are undoubtedly challenging and require preparation, but the aim is always to encourage students to explore new perspectives on their topic and to learn through academic conversation.



Selwyn devotes considerable resources, time, and energy to ensuring that its students get the most out of the supervision system. Each student has a Director of Studies (DoS) – an academic in their subject and based at Selwyn – who supports and oversees their academic progress at Cambridge. The DoS sets up supervision arrangements as well as being available to offer support and advice regarding study skills, course options, and other academic issues and challenges. Each DoS only looks after a small number of students and thus develops a strong knowledge of each student's strengths and interests, helping to guide them accordingly.

Many supervisions for students at Selwyn are provided by the College's academic staff, known as Fellows, but students' options are in no way limited by their choice of College – Directors of Studies will find the best teaching for their students from across the University. In addition, the University organises lectures, seminars, and classes for each course. These bring together all students on a course from across Cambridge. Exams for all students in a subject are the same, and all will receive a University of Cambridge degree.

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Community at Selwyn

The close-knit College environment gives undergraduates, postgraduates, and senior academics the opportunity to mix easily in a scholarly community, bringing everyone together on a single site.



Selwyn admits around 120 undergraduates each year. Within such a close-knit community, there is lots of help and advice available to deal with any challenges that might arise while studying here. Each student has a Tutor – an academic from a different subject – whose role is to offer pastoral support and assistance. Our Tutors are experienced in dealing with all kinds of difficulties that students might face and take a sustained interest in individual students' journeys from their first day through to graduation. The College Nurse and Wellbeing Officer is easily available for consultation, and the Chaplain also offers support to all Selwyn students. The College's Porters, who play a security and reception role, are on site 24/7. This all helps students feel secure and supported at all times. In addition, students support one another with the transition into University life and beyond. Student welfare officers support the work of the Tutors, College Wellbeing Officer, and Directors of Studies by providing peer-to-peer support from within the undergraduate community. Where necessary, our students and staff can signpost students to appropriate services and resources across the University and beyond.

Selwyn's greatest strength is its people. Once you become a member of Selwyn, you are part of a community. Whether it's the Fellows, Porters, or catering staff, they look out for your pastoral and academic needs."

Accommodation at Selwyn





Students only have to pay for 30 weeks per year

We guarantee all undergraduates accommodation for the three or four years of their course. They only have to pay for 30 weeks of term per year unless they choose to stay longer.



Everyone has their own room

There are over 400 undergraduate rooms available in College, two-thirds of which are en-suite. Freshers are together in Cripps Court, where all rooms are en-suite.



Everyone lives in one location

All the College's staircases and houses in which undergraduates live are on a single site.



A key part of the Cambridge experience is living in College alongside your fellow students. All Selwyn's undergraduate rooms are on a single site, and we guarantee accommodation to all students for the three or four years of their undergraduate course. This fosters a cohesive and integrated community among our diverse student body.

All rooms for first-year students have private en-suite facilities and shared kitchenettes for preparing drinks and snacks. A ballot allows second-, third-, and fourth-year students to choose their preferred accommodation. Everyone has their own room (no rooms are shared). We have a range of different types of room, with rents that reflect the size, facilities, and location. All rooms have low-cost and highspeed internet, with both fixed and wireless modes of connection, and IT support is available on-site.

The majority of our accommodation is arranged in three traditional 'courts'. The oldest dates from the 1880s and our newest addition was completed in 2009. There are also a number of large Victorian houses around the site converted into student accommodation. The majority of our accommodation has been refurbished over recent years and two-thirds of our rooms now include en-suite facilities.

Because you only pay rent for the time you're in residence (usually around 30 weeks), annual costs are strikingly low when compared to Cambridge market rates or other universities. Room rents include all bills and maintenance charges (maintenance is carried out by on-site College staff). Our students don't have to worry about finding accommodation from year to year. They can, instead, concentrate on success in their studies.


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Facilities at Selwyn

Our new library opened in 2021. It is a magnificent resource for quiet study arranged over two floors. The library has several study rooms for group work. Around the College there are a wide range of other learning spaces, including supervision rooms, seminar rooms, and a brand new auditorium. Many students also find the recently refurbished café-bar to be an additional, vibrant working space, as well as a place to relax and socialise at any time of day.

Library:

Selwyn's Bartlam Library opened in 2021 and has plenty of space for student working spread across two light and airy floors.

With all undergraduates living on the main site, the dining hall forms a centre of our community. Breakfast, lunch, and dinner are served every day on a cafeteria basis. Twice a week we have 'formal hall' – an opportunity to have a three-course dinner served at the table. To keep them special, they are one of the few occasions when students and Fellows wear academic gowns. They are very popular with those students who choose to attend, but are not compulsory. They are often used as occasions to celebrate a birthday, to invite friends from other Colleges, or to host visitors from outside Cambridge.



All undergraduates are members of the Junior Combination Room (JCR) – Selwyn's student union. The JCR has its own space including a meeting room, a games room, a TV room with film and gaming facilities, and a computer room. It runs academic and social events and also provides welfare services. JCR representatives sit on College committees, giving students a direct voice in the College. The JCR therefore plays a crucial role in maintaining Selwyn's cohesive academic community.





Selwyn has recently invested heavily in new facilities such as the library, auditorium, gym, café-bar, and cafeteria, as well as in student accommodation and teaching resources.

Selwyn's ethos is that academic work forms the core of everyone's experience. Nonetheless, Selwyn students still find time to enjoy a great diversity of extracurricular activities.

There are both College- and University-level clubs and societies. Selwyn has its own teams in many sports, where the emphasis is on representing the College and having fun; you don't have to be a top-rate player, or indeed a player with any experience, to join a team. Those with more serious sporting ambitions, or interest in a less common sport, find it fulfilling to get involved in University-level sports clubs alongside students from other Colleges. Selwyn has a free on-site gym, and our sports ground is a short cycle ride away from the main College site. The University's sports centre is also just a short cycle ride away.

Selwyn's musical life is also rich, and many students join the College's music society. The College has instrumental groups that cover everything from chamber music to jazz, as well as a variety of bands which come and go as the student population changes. The chapel choir has a professional director and sings services three times per week. The choir also gives concert performances, makes recordings, and goes on UK and international tours.

The College's dramatic society meanwhile puts on a range of productions that have included material written by Selwyn students themselves. Summer productions in the gardens, especially of Shakespeare plays, are both traditional and popular.
