Master's Introduction

SUZANNE RAINE

I am pleased to introduce the first annual report as your new head of house. It sets out what Selwyn has achieved in the year and, although this is often through a financial prism, the figures tell a story of the activity, energy and belief in Selwyn which underlies them.

We have strong aims: to deliver excellent academic results and draw from across the spectrum of society. Last year we succeeded. 38% of our undergraduates were awarded firsts in 2025, well above the University average. Yet again, 80% of our UK undergraduates came from state schools, one of the highest proportions in Cambridge. We ranked second in the Baxter Table, and a close third in the Tompkins Table of Cambridge colleges. Sixteen students won University prizes and six were awarded starred firsts. In 2025, our female students achieved firsts at almost exactly the same rate as our male students, with hardly any attainment gap. This contrasts sharply across Cambridge where 25.3% of female candidates obtained firsts as opposed to 34.7% of males. As we prepare to celebrate 50 years since women first came to Selwyn in 2026/27, this parity feels particularly significant. We have to conclude that these successes are down to the strong community and support Selwyn provides, with world-leading researchers committed to teaching.

The word 'community' might be overused, but it is clear to me that Selwyn is a concrete example of something which is increasingly rare in the modern world – a place where people live, dine, study and research together, and benefit from the shared experience. Our staff create an environment where people are able to thrive. People from different academic fields come together to learn from each other. Our postgraduates come from 35–45 countries, studying across about 40 departments.

Despite the often gloomy headlines about the economy and the costs of higher education, we are continuing to balance our books thanks to our own endeavours and the support from our alumni. This year, the response to our fundraising efforts has been extraordinary. We have so far reached 70% of our total aim of £2.5m for the Ann's Court North project, with over £350,000 gained from the telephone campaign alone. Our endowment income stands at £2.1m – which is 42% more than a decade ago – giving us £2.6m in net asset growth this year. This financial strength underpins what we can do. You will also read here that in just one year there have been six new scholarship opportunities for postgraduates. As career opportunities shrink, it is vital that we are able to continue to provide places for early career academics to develop their skills and thinking.

When I reflect on what we have collectively achieved over the last year, I see our community believes in what we're building. You trust that your generosity will actually change things. I am committed to making sure that is the case. ✦

Bursar's Report

INTRODUCTION

The year ending 30 June 2025 was a mix of good news, tempered by a clear sense of the challenges ahead.

THE FINANCES

The published and audited college accounts focus their analysis of our performance across three main activities. As with last year, I want to use these to think about how we are progressing against the College's charitable purposes. I'm going to start with the most positive...

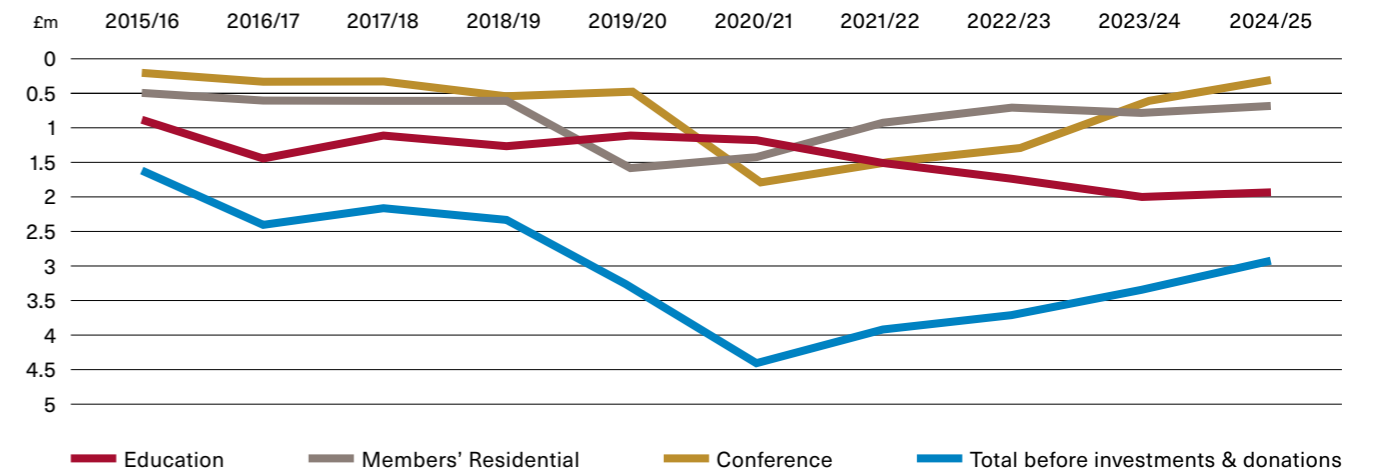
Conference activities are allocated nearly a third of the annual wage bill for catering and the estate, and so allow us to employ staff year round. This year the conference deficit fell below £0.3m. In the strongest year in the College's financial history – 2015/16 – the deficit was just over £0.2m. So £0.3m is a great result, especially in the context of rising wage costs and utility bills. Whilst some families may not relish the return of undergraduates and their laundry at the end of each FPR (as our termly fixed period of residence is known), we know those able to take a break from the intense Cambridge terms benefit from it – both financially and in terms of rest and recuperation. And in College we use those vacations, to generate income from our facilities to support the college's finances. There are risks to this income stream. Much of it arises from commercial summer schools. These attract international students but enrolment fluctuates unpredictably because of geopolitical events. Conference quality standards in student accommodation are expensive to maintain, but they serve students well. They make the College an attractive venue for the vacations. It means we have to balance use against academic and admissions needs,

and so the team's expertise in efficient use of space has been critical in achieving the improved deficit position, so that we are now very close to 'full' year round – making future improvements more challenging. Importantly there are also non-financial benefits, and we are pleased to have guests from across the world come to Cambridge to experience a different educational atmosphere and encourage an ambitious response to learning, no matter where they end up studying thereafter.

Members' residential and catering activities have also improved financially. In 2015/16, the deficit was £0.5m and in 2024/25 it was £0.7m. Again, wage costs and utility inflation have hampered recovery. We try to hold costs down for students where we can, with the unwinding of the peak in utility costs enabling a rent increase of only 1.5% this year – but maintaining breakeven on the rent account is a critical focus. Catering continues to lose money. Competition from food courier services is challenging no matter how bright, cheerful, welcoming our servery staff, or how nutritionally well balanced our meals are. We believe our catering service is a worthwhile investment as it ensures students can access hot, healthy, meals, and eat with others as a community. Feedback on our pricing and range is generally good. Our vegan Head Chef and cost conscious Catering Manager balance our delivery nicely. Meals are also a key workplace benefit to staff

and Fellows feeling the pinch when wage inflation awards in this part of the public sector have struggled to match food cost rises (in 2025 academic pay rose by just 1.4%). However, in light of the ongoing pressures from changes to employer's National Insurance and employment rights, we are consulting on ways to streamline what we offer. Closures at low occupancy periods may increase, not least because recent changes in employment law will make offering flexible roles to casual staff more challenging.

It is in **education** that things remain stickiest. In 2025/26 we finally have an increase in the regulated tuition fee for home students, where our 50% share of the fee (the rest flows to the University) will help in meeting the basic rises in the cost of teaching and tutorial support. These are £1.4m or 57% higher than back in 2015/16, where the fee will have risen in two of ten years, and by just under 6%. Some of these rises in

College costs have been led by philanthropy. Examples include the near doubling of our spend on studentships to support postgraduate study, and in activities and staffing supporting access to higher education. The Harrison Fund now supports a named engineering Fellow, and our thanks continue to those that support or have supported teaching roles in maths, law, economics and modern languages. Ongoing support for small group supervision teaching by experts in their field remains firmly at the core of our Cambridge educational differentiation. We remain committed to sustaining it while we can.

In aggregate we are left with a steadily reducing deficit, £2.9m, from all these activities versus £1.6m in 2015/16. How can the books continue to balance? For that, we must look at the long-term trajectories of investment income and donations.

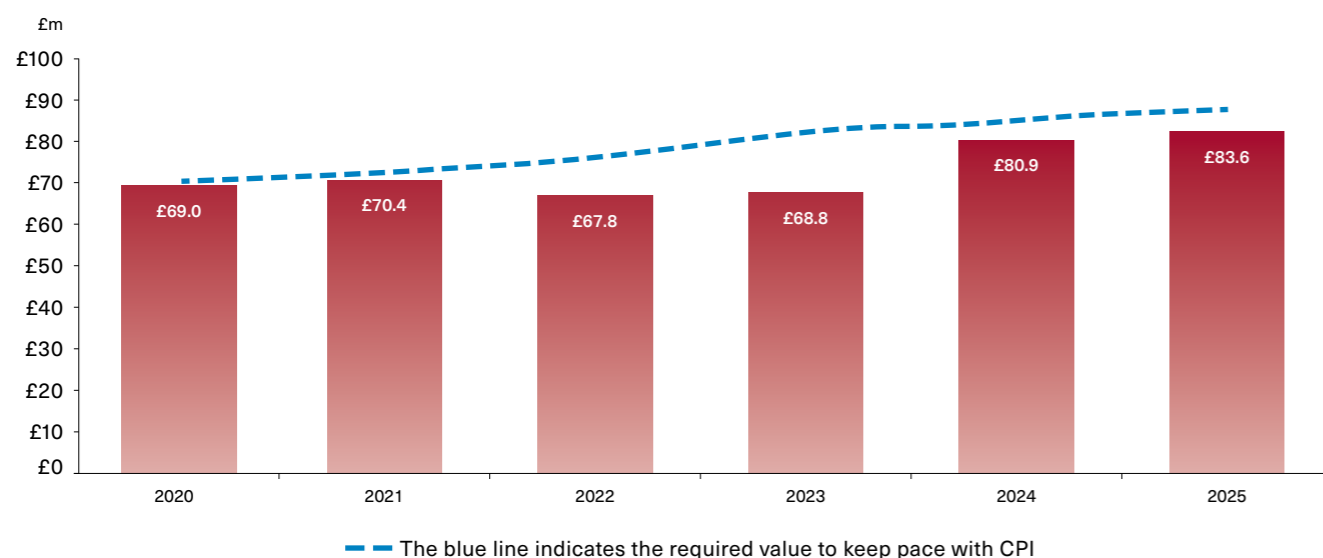

Investment income is the most stable source of income supporting our educational aims. The College drew on its investment portfolio at a rate of 3.125% (based on a five year average value), weaning itself steadily back to the 3% long term target after taking a little more in the difficult inflationary years immediately following the pandemic. This delivered £2.1m of endowment income – 42% more than in 2015/16. Around half is restricted, mainly in ways that support student welfare and education. Over the year, the portfolio – split between Cazenove Capital and the Cambridge University Endowment Fund or CUEF – achieved average returns of 2.8%. The portfolio trailed our various benchmarks mainly due to lower holdings of the ‘magnificent seven’ technology

stocks than in the benchmark indices, as excitement around artificial intelligence boosted returns for these dominant firms. In our first six months with Cazenove from late December 2023, performance ran ahead of our benchmarks. Cazenove’s Sustainable Multi-Asset Fund is very similar in structure to our portfolio and its returns are illustrated above. The CUEF investment performed more consistently. We continue to watch performance carefully.

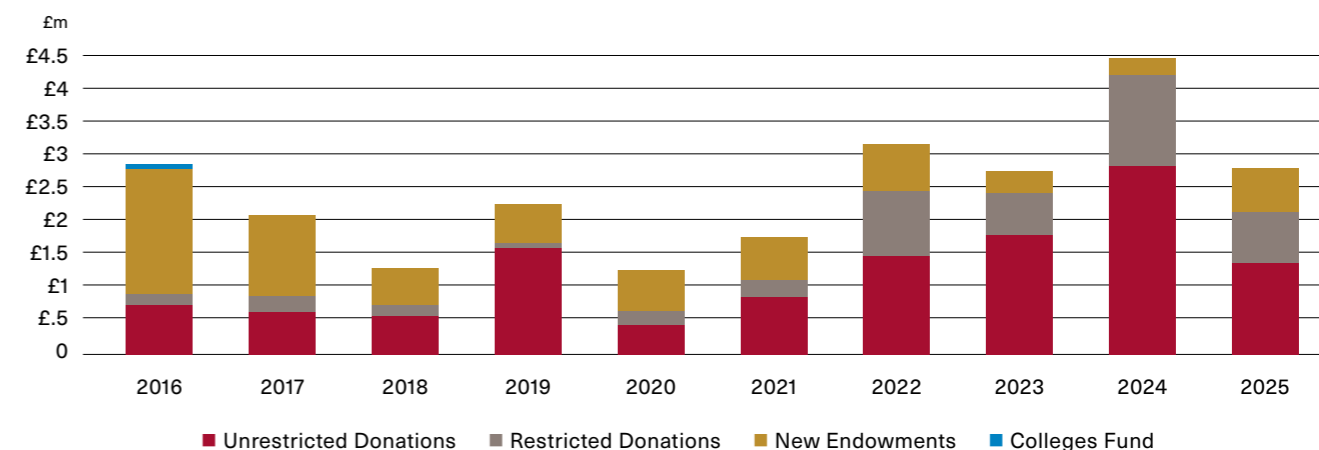
A key measure over the long term is whether the investments – and hence the income they generate – keep pace with consumer price inflation (CPI), as a proxy for College costs. As the graph shows, things have certainly improved since 2022 and 2023.

Donations totalled £2.8m in the year, excluding grants for capital projects. Individual year comparisons make limited sense here, but the graph illustrates why we appreciate your generosity so much. Nearly £0.7m was endowed funding, with a significant amount added to the student support ‘Challenge’ fund that allows Selwyn (and every Cambridge College) to give lower household income undergraduates an automatic £3.5k top up grant in addition to their maintenance loan. This goes a long way to prevent financial considerations limiting access. £0.8m of expendable funding was restricted in use, with the biggest areas in studentships, access and participation funding, hardship funds and prizes. The balance of £1.4m was applied to build up the savings required to afford our planned capital projects, seed funding in support of studentships (where matched funding can be as high as 75%), and inevitably, support of teaching.

Capital projects remain central to college planning. Last year’s accounts indicate the support gratefully received from the Cripps Foundation to support solar panel installations in 2024. Looking forward, the campaign to support the redevelopment of Ann’s Court North – the two hostels on the north side of Ann’s Court, part of the Cambridge city conservation area – has begun. For a project expected to cost around £4m we hope to raise around £2.5m through donations. Alongside the necessary refurbishment of properties we bought from Gonville and Caius in 1963, we will reduce carbon footprint by at least 50%. We will make the ground floor generally (and one residential flat explicitly) accessible, and create two garden-facing social study spaces for students who report that they “love working in the Café Bar” but can’t afford to drink enough coffee for us to keep it staffed and open 24/7/365. If these pilot spaces work we will keep

the idea in the mix on future projects. Thank you to all those who have already committed support.

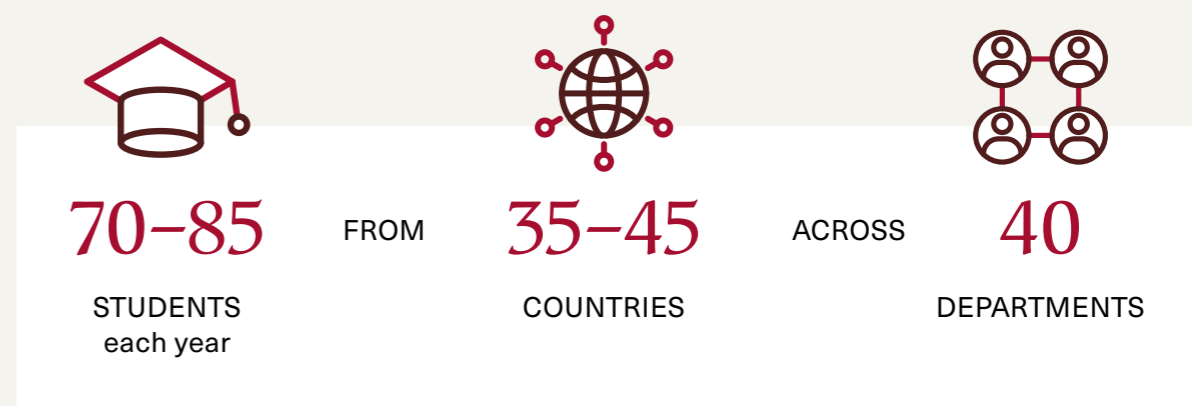
The net impact of all these changes has been a £2.6m increase in the College’s balance sheet net assets. Our financial strength continues to improve steadily, as we focus on meeting our charitable objectives, first and foremost. We remain proud of our merit-based admissions – strong maintained sector intake proves no barrier to achievement. We rank in the top three amongst colleges across a range of measures in the 2025 Tripos examinations. Attracting the best postgraduate students presents us with more complex funding challenges, but we continue to believe Selwyn offers a strong community and close academic support as graduates navigate more advanced studies.

OUTLOOK

The outside world feels more uncertain daily. Though our investments seem reasonably resilient, the scale of changes in shifting geopolitical relationships, artificial intelligence, conflicts and related defence spending comes through in the portfolio’s shifting valuations. All these things have moved on considerably in the three years since I joined Selwyn as Bursar. Conversely, and reassuringly, the College remains right here, year after year, putting students and academic achievement first. We do so in a supportive environment where many bright minds are trying to solve issues like those above for all of us. Though governmental changes may be making things harder (and more expensive) to navigate, it is very hard not to be optimistic. We will continue to stretch minds, and send them out to influence the world around us, for a long time to come. ✳



Welcoming Postgraduate Scholars



Our Postgraduate Admissions Tutor, Professor Jörg Haustein, and Tutor for Part-time Postgraduate Students, Dr David Smith, reflect on the remarkable diversity of postgraduate talent we welcome each year — and the work that goes into supporting them.

One of the most rewarding aspects of being a Postgraduate Tutor is to meet our incoming students each year and hear about their projects. The diversity of talent and research excellence at this University is impressive, and collegiate life at Cambridge makes this rich plurality an everyday experience.

At Selwyn College we seek to mirror the University's excellence and breadth in our postgraduate community. We admit between 70 and 85 full-time postgraduate students each year, hailing from 35 to 45 different countries and studying at around 40 different University departments. Usually, most are women, and the majority will be here for a one-year degree, such as the MPhil. While our PhD students are a minority of our annual intake, they stay with us for three to four years. This places our full-time postgraduate cohort at around 120 students in any given year.

Each year, the College receives between 150 and 200 applications. We can admit fewer than half because, unlike many colleges, we offer guaranteed accommodation. It restrains our capacity but helps alleviate a common source of anxiety for students. It also forges a strong postgraduate community on campus and encourages us to select carefully based on applicants' stated college preference, their eligibility for studentships, and feedback from our Fellows. The latter is particularly important for MPhil students as each is assigned a Director of Studies from among the Fellows in their subject. This offers an important additional tier of support beyond their College Tutor – chosen from our team consisting of Dr Oleg Kitov, Professor Jörg Haustein, Professor Robert Tasker and Dr Iman Tavakkolnia.

In addition, Selwyn now has over 100 part-time students, mostly enrolled in one of the various two-year MSt courses that Cambridge offers through PACE (Professional and Continuing Education). Selwyn currently accepts students for the MSt programmes in International Relations, History, Applied Criminology and Police Management, Social Innovation, Creative Writing and Writing for Performance. There are also a few students who are working towards the MPhil or PhD degrees on a part-time basis. Selwyn's part-

time students are a notably diverse group, and many of them combine their part-time studies with heavy professional and/or family commitments. They enrich our postgraduate community and contribute to the wider life of the College. In Dr David Smith they have their own designated College Tutor.

Planning postgraduate admissions presents real challenges, in particular when reserving housing for incoming full-time students. Not all are able to take up their offer in the end, often due to a lack of funding. Historical data helps with predictions on offer to admissions ratios, but this is becoming less certain as funding opportunities are eroding. We see this especially in our PhD cohort, whose share has decreased significantly in the last five years alone, in line with broader trends in the University.

This is why we are grateful to donors who in recent years have responded to our efforts to expand the studentships available to our postgraduate students.

This year alone, we advertised six new scholarship opportunities, including three PhD studentships. We have secured match funding in some cases, for example, via the Cambridge Trust or as one of the first Colleges participating in the new Trinity-Cambridge Research Studentship scheme. The power of studentships in attracting outstanding applicants has become particularly evident in the MPhil in Conservation Leadership, where Selwyn offers two studentships and regularly attracts outstanding applicants. ✦

Exploring the World

Thanks to the financial help of numerous alumni and friends, the college is able to offer its students all sorts of opportunities to support travel, study and work abroad. Along the way, there are encounters with different languages, customs and standards of living. These experiences can be life changing and at the very least help to foster a greater sense of independence and confidence. We're pleased to share a few reflections from students who set out to extend their studies and broaden their minds over the long vacation.

BERLIN: KREUZBERG

ELEANOR VOAK (2023)

Human, Social and Political Sciences



The purpose of my research trip to Berlin was to conduct fieldwork for my undergraduate dissertation on the politics of authenticity, gentrification and urban restructuring in the Kreuzberg district.

During my time there, I carried out semi-structured interviews with activists, artists and cultural producers; visited key sites including Kottbusser Tor and Görlitzer Park; and observed how tourism, city branding, local politics and social media shape perceptions of ‘authentic’ Berlin.

The Malcolm Coffin travel grant enabled essential research that would have been impossible through desk-

based methods alone. Walking through Kreuzberg revealed how streets transformed by gentrification sit in immediate proximity to areas long associated with territorial stigmatisation and political contestation.

Experiencing this spatial adjacency deepened my analysis of authenticity as something selectively valued and continually redefined. Rather than a fixed quality, it emerged as unevenly mobilised — celebrated in some contexts and stigmatised in others. I return with a much richer spatial and socio-logical analysis than I could have developed from Cambridge alone.



VIETNAM AND LAOS

MAX THOMPSON (2024), Medicine



I spent four weeks travelling solo around Vietnam and Laos, supported by funding from Selwyn.

From Hanoi I took an overnight bus to Hà Giang for a four-day motorbike tour through the surrounding province. When a storm flooded the roads, making passage impossible, my driver

explained this was routine. People in remote villages are frequently cut off from healthcare and education in larger towns.

Back in Hanoi, I sought treatment for an ear infection and was struck by how readily antibiotics were available without prescription. What would be secondary care in the UK was accessible as a walk-in patient.

Rather than continue south as planned, I bought a flight to Laos instead. In Vientiane, I visited the Mines Advisory Group Unexploded Ordinance Museum and learned that Laos is the world's most heavily bombed country per capita. Between 1964 and 1973, over two million tons of bombs were dropped, with an estimated 30% never detonating — still devastating communities today.

Solo travel proved particularly rewarding, allowing me to immerse myself deeply in different cultures. I hope to return during my elective period to gain deeper insight into Southeast Asian healthcare systems.

ITALY

DARONG HUANG (2023), Engineering



Over seven days in Venice, Florence and Rome, I studied the use and development of structural engineering techniques in architecture.

I visited structures spanning from second century temples to modern reinforced concrete stadiums, observing how traditional elements — columns, arches, domes and vaults — were used to achieve large spans and shape building layouts. The dome of Santa Maria del Fiore in Florence, seen from the adjacent bell tower, and the Pantheon with its impressive unreinforced concrete span, were particular highlights.

I visited two works by Pier Luigi Nervi: the Palazzo dello Sport and Palazzetto dello Sport, which demonstrated

creative design and efficient use of reinforced concrete for large spaces. At the MAXXI museum, an exhibition on the historical development of sport stadiums provided context and scale models. The museum building itself was inspiring, using self-compacting concrete that enabled its unique design without concrete joints or supporting framework.

This trip strengthened my understanding of structural systems, materials, and scale. The knowledge I gained will inform my coursework, Part II projects, and future professional practice.



PANAMA AND COSTA RICA

ASHA SCOTT (2024), Geography



Using the Cockayne and General Travel funds, I spent three weeks travelling through Panama and Costa Rica.

In Panama City, I visited the Metropolitan National Park observing how different forms of public transport coexist. Modern metro buses sit alongside ‘diablos rojos’, former school buses brightly painted with art and religious symbolism. This contrast highlighted how rapid economic growth is challenged by informal networks, despite government attempts to phase them out.

A conversation about expatriates versus immigrants prompted me to question Eurocentric assumptions. Why are retired American residents called ‘expats’ while Panamanians in the US would be ‘immigrants’? These perceptions reveal how power shapes language and belonging.

Crossing into Costa Rica on foot was exhilarating. In Puerto Viejo, I learned that English wasn't as widely spoken as I'd assumed—a reminder that Eurocentric ideals don't dominate globally.

Throughout, I noticed ‘Pura Vida’ everywhere, from clothes to street signs. It extends

beyond the direct translation Pure Life, into deep cultural significance about sustainability and peace.

Throughout, I improved my Spanish dramatically and made lasting friendships. The trip taught me patience, resilience, and much about myself and my future goals.



VANCOVER

THOMAS FISH (2023), Physical Natural Sciences



This past summer I lived in Vancouver and completed an internship with Global Relay Communications, a SaaS business specialising in digital archiving and message surveillance technology.

Over 12 weeks, I first worked as a business analyst using Excel and Salesforce to track revenue and data ingestion. I cleaned large datasets, built a time-series metrics dashboard with VBA automation, and assisted in sales planning. This taught me the importance of translating complex outputs into useful information for business decision-making.

In the AI team, I implemented prompt engineering techniques and explored dataset generation methods using multilayer LLM prompting. I researched Retrieval-Augmented Generation (RAG) and Model Context Protocol (MCP) in agentic assistant tools. This deepened my understanding of the challenges involved in developing AI-driven products and strengthened my technical skills in applied research and collaborative software development.

Living abroad independently — navigating challenges, solving administrative problems, overcoming obstacles — built resilience and confidence. The experience reinforced the importance of adaptability and curiosity in building a career.





A Sense of Belonging

Beatrix Comey (2024) came to Selwyn to read languages expecting relentless academic pressure. Two years on, she has the words for what she found: balance, belonging and the unexpected joy of dressing as a caterpillar.

My time at Cambridge so far has been full of the unexpected in the best way. What I hadn't anticipated was how quickly time would pass, without me even fully realising it. With the countless socials and events, amazing company and short eight-week terms, the weeks blur into each other and the fleeting nature of Cambridge's busy schedule means term finishes almost as soon as it began.

I arrived at Selwyn expecting to be swamped with work from day one, chained to a library desk writing endless supervision essays. And while my degree has not been effortless, what I found instead during my first year at Cambridge was balance. While the busy workload and deadlines are demanding, Cambridge taught me the value of taking breaks and stepping back from my degree and into making memories: late-night chats in the kitchen, coffee catch ups and long walks through this beautiful, historic city. For the first time, I have found a routine which works for me and a new found appreciation for the productivity of rest.

What has stuck with me most since living here is the strength of Selwyn's community. After four terms here, I noticed myself almost unconsciously referring to it as 'home', which is in no small part down to the warmth and openness which our College cultivates, turning a group of nervous freshers from strangers to life-long friends. While Cambridge's intense academic workload is undeniable, there is an equally strong commitment to the work-hard-play-hard mindset. Within a week, I found myself dressed as both a hotdog and a caterpillar with people who have become some of my closest friends. It is this silliness which has given rise to some of my favourite memories, a warmly received surprise from such a serious institution.

Before moving to Selwyn, I questioned everything – whether Cambridge was the right place for me, whether I would be capable of my course, whether I would truly fit in. Now, officially halfway through, those doubts have quietened. Choosing both Cambridge and Selwyn has been the right decision, and I am deeply grateful that I did – not least due to the incredible people this experience has brought into my life. It is the people and the community underneath the academic intensity, this personal, human side to Cambridge, which is what I will miss most and which has surprised me in the best way. ✱

On the fundraising side of things – alumni and friends have once again been enormously generous – thank you. In December, our annual telephone campaign raised over £350,000 – our best ever result in all the years I've been here. It's a tough job for our team of student callers, not least because so many people are disinclined to pick up the phone these days. Yet the students' quiet and good-humoured persistence paid great dividends and resulted eventually in over 400 conversations with alumni worldwide. Some of these funds have helped our Ann's Court North appeal raise over £1.75m so far, which means the £2.5m fundraising target is well within reach. Additionally, alumni have provided many new funds directly supporting individual students, including new PhD and MPhil scholarships, which are the foundations for research across subjects. Donations for these scholarships can attract up to 75% leverage from other sources – so it's an attractive way to support research in a subject area that may be close to your heart. Similarly, many individuals have shared with us their wishes as to how they would like a legacy to be eventually used. This can be so useful in helping the college with its longer-term strategic planning. Many of us don't have

the means to provide larger donations during our lifetime – but we believe it's important to recognise the intention of those who choose to help via the gift of a legacy. So, while you will find the college grateful to have the opportunity to acknowledge your legacy plans – they are nevertheless plans that we are in no hurry to see realised. If you've already read the report from the Bursar, you will know that Selwyn faces various economic challenges. Some are beyond our control, but others are considerably mitigated by the support from our alumni and friends, which I'm sure will continue. Undoubtedly there will be changes ahead and that's as it should be. I have no doubt that as Selwyn gears up towards celebrating its 150th anniversary in 2032 its best years still lie ahead. ✦
