
# Sustainability at Selwyn

# In Student Accommodation, there's now...

- An expanding food waste recycling system for student kitchens
- Renewable Selwyn electricity in the normal course of business - not just carbon offsetting either
- Solar panels on Cripps Court feed renewable energy into the grid
- College-wide heating for the 2022/23 academic year being turned on later and turned off earlier than previous years
- The 'Three Hostels Project' (postgraduate hostels 29GR, 31GR and 1SG), including provision of ground source heat pumps and electric vehicle charging points
  Housekeeping cleaning products are plant-based
- Communal area lighting being replaced with LEDs

#### In Hall, we've seen...

- Removal of disposable takeaway boxes
- Replacing Single-use packeted condiments with sauce 'pumps'
- Introduction of termly Vegan Formal Halls
- An **expanding selection of plant-based options** from the Servery, supported by the majority of the student body
- An ongoing project on **Carbon** footprint labelling the servery meals
- Cheaper takeaway hot drinks if you bring your own cup
