


NEWNHAM, LUCY CAVENDISH AND SELWYN COLLEGES

CHRISTOPHER MONCRIEFF, our Royal Literary Fund Writing Fellow, can give advice to students and staff from all disciplines, on all aspects of their writing.

Christopher Moncrieff is a poet and literary translator from French, German and Romanian, including the novels of Gracq, Zeller, Musil, Kafka and Eliade. Before beginning to write full-time, he served as a professional soldier in Europe, North America and the Near East, then went on to produce multi-media shows, living in Paris and Los Angeles. He read Theology at Pembroke College, Oxford and also has qualifications in design. His work, which is influenced by frequent travels in Central and Eastern Europe, has been published in the UK, the USA and Romania, and a new collection of poetry is due in autumn 2019. He campaigns for the acceptance of neuro- and gender diversity and has worked as a mentor for young adults on the autism spectrum. This is his second year as the Writing Fellow at Newnham.
